President's Corner - Chuck Croft

During the Potomac Bonsai Association's (PBA) Spring Festival the past couple of years, we have tried to enhance the experience and foster the growth of our bonsai skills by sponsoring a Regional Juried Show and have begun sponsoring a New Talent Competition. The latter is also sponsored by the Joshua Roth New Talent Competition in that our regional winner is provided an automatic berth in the National New Talent Competition.

In addition to these newer efforts, PBA has continued to publish the *PBA Clippings* in order to keep members apprised of activities within the various member clubs and around the bonsai world. Even though the frequency of publication has decreased from a monthly to a quarterly publication, I believe that the *PBA Clippings* has fulfilled its purpose quite well during the 17 years I have been privileged to be a PBA member, in spite of the false starts and perturbations experienced during the transition from publishing a mailed hard-copy newsletter to publishing a primarily electronic publication.

Finally, PBA has the charter to educate its membership and the public about the care, horticulture, styling, and aesthetics of bonsai and bonsai related activities. At one time, we had a program that members took to some of our high schools to teach students. Currently, a number of our members routinely give talks and workshops at a variety of venues throughout the year, including during our PBA Spring Festival. At each of our activities, we dispense a brochure to participants explaining what PBA is and what the organization does.

Each of the activities presented above has, over the years, enticed new members to join one or another of our member clubs and to participate in our activities. Also, as time goes on, our membership is changing. Some members drop out because of other time constraints, some move out of the area and join other organizations, and some retire from bonsai for health reasons, etc. First and foremost, the Potomac Bonsai Association is an organization of volunteers who are members of the member clubs. Thus, it is the Potomac Bonsai Association's membership that should be served first.

Therefore, I will be making arrangements over the next few months to try to attend a meeting of each member

club. My goal is to get feedback from each of you on what you think PBA should be doing or trying to do for you and for your individual member clubs. You do not need to wait for my visit, though. My email address and phone number are listed in this newsletter. Please feel free to either email me or call me to discuss your ideas. I cannot guarantee that each of your ideas will be adopted, but I can guarantee that each of your ideas will be considered by the PBA Board. Some ideas may be adopted at the local club level while others may be adopted at the PBA level. I look forward to hearing your ideas and to discussing them with you and with your Board Members.

Circle The Wagons: Support Thee American Bonsai Society - John Ruth

I had the bittersweet pleasure of attending Bill Valavanis' annual Fall Symposium last month. It was indeed a pleasure, getting to see Mary Madison, the "Buttonwood Queen", talk about collecting in Florida amongst alligators, water moccasins, and drug smugglers; David Easterbrook, who, while styling an ancient larch, regaled us about collecting in the arctic circle, in sight of whales and Inuit fishing villages in the St. Lawrence river; and not least having the impressive Ryan Neil do wonderful work on a Rocky Mountain juniper and a Black Hills spruce while deftly answering probing questions from the audience about life with his "Master", Masahiko Kimura. The vendors were of the highest quality, and the sense of camaraderie, the product of core attendees having returned for most (and for a few, all) of the thirty yearly symposia, was almost palpa-

ble, even during critical discussions of the excellent show trees.

What made the gathering bittersweet was Bill's announcement at the Saturday banquet that this meeting would be the last of the symposia. He cited his commitment to building the biannual National Exhibitions, which he sponsors, but note was made in the hallways and meeting rooms of a steady decline in attendance over the last several years, of vendors not meeting sales expectations, and the aging of the core supporters of the meeting.

This phenomenon, though, has not been limited to the Rochester show. Mid-Atlantic and MABA in the Midwest have had smaller crowds recently. In my town, Baltimore, we not too long ago had two nurseries dedicated to bonsai. Now there are none, with the closest being 75 minutes away, in Harrisburg. (That said, it's worth the drive). And many in PBA remember when the member list was almost twice what it is now.

Is it all "gloom and doom" for our art form? Of course not. The fact that you are reading this speaks to your own enthusiasm. The Baltimore Bonsai Club is probably the largest it has been in ten years, with many young, enthusiastic members. Perusal of Clippings shows that the Northern Virginia and Brookside clubs, in particular, have vital, active schedules. PBA itself, in collaboration with the National Bonsai Foundation and the National Arboretum, has delivered a much better product in its spring festival than was the case several years ago.

But there are things that PBA cannot at present pull off, and for that reason I think that it is important to participate also in our national organization, the American Bonsai Society. ABS strives to promote the art of bonsai throughout North America. It has the breadth, and the budget, to sponsor large meetings, with dozens of lectures, workshops, and demonstrations. Membership in ABS delivers on many fronts. The excellent journal features regional experts discussing the care of various species and subjects relevant to us. There are reviews of shows, courses of bonsai study, and a schedule of upcoming events. Another advantage of membership is access to the ABS Forum, an internet-based discussion group that allows one to ask questions on any bonsai-related topic. Multiple responses, sometimes lively, ensue. (A regular contributor, always thoughtful, is our own "Sensei Sam", Jim Sullivan). ABS also sponsors a variety of contests designed to help grow awareness of bonsai in the general public, and promotes a sense of community amongst those of us who are already involved.

The more we come together to promote bonsai, the more people become intrigued by bonsai. When that happens, it becomes more economically viable for merchants who provide bonsai-specific services and materials, and we all end up with a richer experience.

So do yourself, and our art, a favor. Please let me know if you are interested in joining ABS.

ABOUT FACE

Have you ever worked on a bonsai for months, or even years, and suddenly come to the realization that it looks like c---? The realization may not be so sudden. You may see a similar, but much nicer composition in a magazine, on the Internet, or at a show. It may come as a gentle suggestion from a fellow club member or a mild criticism from a viewer at a public display. Hopefully it did not, or does not, come in the form of group pointing and laughing; or as in my case, a public rebuke by the icon John Naka.

Thinking through the composition, viewing similar examples before beginning, and seeking a second opinion, should certainly help in avoiding a redo. Not only is time lost, but materials are wasted and the tree is often stressed in the rewiring and/or repotting process. Worst of all, you may agonize over your mistakes as your bonsai lies hidden, awaiting repotting season or delivery of another several hundred feet of wire.

I hope the accompanying pictures help illustrate, in my opinion, improvements made to one bonsai composition (another will be presented in the next issue). The Japanese Maple was trained from a collected seedling given me by Jim Rieden of the Brookside club. Jim was a kind and generous man and I can still see him walking among the trees at the PBA spring show, anointing them with his sprayer as if bestowing a special blessing on each one.

Despite the tree's special place in my heart, it apparently held no such status for my dog. While chasing a

chipmunk, she turned a triple trunk into a twin trunk. The loss of that trunk, the largest of the three, dramatically changed the composition. Because it was the largest, it occupied more area than the other two trunks and branches, and it also leaned towards the other end of the pot. With it gone, it appeared as if the tree were planted in the wrong position. So, I repotted the maple and did some minor wiring in an attempt to harmonize the direction of some new growth with the established trunks.

After the loss of Jim, it is even more important to me now to keep the maple from harm's way, on a display bench with the status it deserves.
